

Purpose: The Board recognizes the importance of having informed trustees. To ensure this, the Board provides, within the limits of its budget, orientation programs, financial support for attendance at library conferences and relevant workshops, and institutional membership in library organizations.

1. Orientation

- 1.1. The Chair of the Human Resources and Finance Committee, along with the Board Chair, organize an orientation session for new trustees to familiarize them with:
 - 1.1.1. The Chief Librarian, the Library, and its services
 - 1.1.2. A trustee's responsibilities and duties
 - 1.1.3. The provincial library environment
- 1.2. Each trustee receives a Policy manual to be returned at the end of their time on the Board.
- 1.3. Each trustee receives a Trustee Handbook. Content for the Handbook is determined by the Human Resources and Finance Committee.
- 1.4. The January Board meeting includes discussion on Policy G.1 on board governance and the Committee Terms of Reference.

2. Education

- 2.1. All trustees are encouraged to attend library conferences, with costs covered in accordance with Policy HR.6 on travel.
 - 2.1.1. Budget limitations may restrict the number of conference attendees. Priority is usually given to trustees who have not attended previous library conferences; however, at the discretion of the Board Chair, this may be overridden by the needs of the Board.
 - 2.1.2. Trustees are expected to provide a written report to the Board.
- 2.2. The Board holds an annual retreat.
- 2.3. All trustees are strongly encouraged to attend Trustee workshops. If budget limitations restrict the number of attendees, new trustees have priority.

3. Recognition

- 3.1 A retiring trustee who has completed their appointed term will be recognized for their contribution by the current Board at the Volunteer Recognition Brunch the following year.

4. Association Membership

- 4.1. The Board maintains memberships in both provincial and national trustee associations.
- 4.2. Trustees are encouraged to actively participate in the trustee associations.
